The style guide

1. Title of the article

1.1. the title should contain no more than 7-9 words, and it should be formulated in such a way that it does not use punctuation marks, quotation marks, numbers (Latin and Arabic), initials and abbreviations.

2. The names of the authors

2.1. You must specify the full name, the middle initial (if any) and surname.

2.2. The name of the author in all cases should be written the same way

3. Affiliations

3.1. Please include your full mailing address of the organization, with index.

3.2. No unnecessary information (information about departments organizations - departments, divisions, etc.).

3.3 address of the organization indicated similar around edition format: St. Petersburg State University, 7-9, Universitetskaya nab., St. Petersburg, 199034, Russia.

4. Annotations

4.1. The recommended abstract length is 250-350 words. It is recommended to make the annotation as detailed as possible.

4.2. The abstract should be a single paragraph.

4.3. Annotations should not contain numbered / bulleted lists.

4.4. The abstract should not be references.

4.5. It is not recommended to use abbreviations (except for well-known) and formulas

5. Keywords

5.1. The maximum number of keywords to the article should be 5-10 words.

5.2. Do not use quotation marks (instead of quotation marks to highlight a word in italics).

5.3. The keywords should not include abbreviations (except commonly known) and formulas.

5.4. Among the key words should not be difficult word-combinations and phrases.

6. Information about the authors

6.1. Departments and administrative positions (Dean, head of Department etc.) are not specified.

6.2. Academic degrees and titles should be reduced.

Prof., Ass. Prof., PhD; Dr. Sci. in Law, etc.

7. Figures and tables

7.1. Drawings and diagrams should be submitted as separate files, in a format that allows editing. Graphs should be made in Excel, photoshop image editors (preferably files in .psd format), Corel Draw (not converted to curves), and formulas – in MathType formula editors or embedded in MS Word.

7.2. The numbering of the drawings through the text of the article.

7.3. The attached images should be in electronic format .tif or .jpeg. The resolution is at least 300 dpi. You can't change the size of the original image – stretch or compress the image.

7.4. Captions are mandatory and are provided in the language of the article. The text is placed under the drawing or diagram, for example: Fig.1. Name.

7.5. write the table Name above the table, for example: table 1. Name. Tables should not be scanned, but created in MS Word or MS Excel. The data source must be specified under the table if the table is not authored.

7.6. Sources of figures or tables must be specified, for example: Compiled by: [Ivanov, 2002] or Source: [Ivanov, 2002, p. 5-6].

7.7. If the photo (picture) taken from a public image Bank, allowing the free download content, you must specify: the name of the Agency and website, a link to a resource, the author, the year of creation or publication of the photograph (drawing).

7.8. If photos (drawings) are borrowed from other sources, you must provide a written permission of the copyright holder to use the drawing (for example, an email), and in the caption to the drawing, specify the source of the borrowing and the copyright holder.

8. The text of the article

8.1. If the text of the article contains inscriptions in languages that use a writing system other than Cyrillic / Latin (hieroglyphs, Arabic script, etc.), in addition to the text document, you must provide a pdf version of the article.

8.2. If the article contains figures and / or tables, the main text of the article should contain references to each of these elements.

8.3. page-by-page footnotes should not contain references to figures and tables.

8.4. Names of companies, books, magazines, and other words written in Latin characters are given in the text in Latin letters without quotation marks or highlighting.

8.5. all abbreviations must be fully disclosed when first used, with the exception of generally accepted and mathematical values.

9. References and notes

9.1. References and notes issued in the form of page references in the text shall bear the number of the footnote, the footnote shall be made down the strip.

9.2. Numbering of footnotes-through the entire text of the manuscript.

9.3. References and notes are drawn up in accordance with Chicago Style (Author – Date).

10. References

10.1. the List of References should be designed strictly in accordance with the established rules for the design of literature adopted in this journal.

10.2. The list of References includes all the sources from the bibliography. Sources in languages using Cyrillic or Eastern languages are transliterated.

10.3. A list of References is made in Chicago Style (Author – Date).

11. Transliteration rules

11.1. Transliteration in the References list must be performed in the Library of Congress system. You can use the site for transliteration <https://translit.ru/lc/> or <http://www.convertcyrillic.com/#/convert>. In the second case, select the Ala-LC (Library of Congress) installation in the Convert to field) Romanization without Diacritics [Russkii iazyk].

11.2. Transliterated references to articles from journals, collections of articles and conference materials:

11.2.1. transliteration of the authors ' last name, translation of the article title, transliteration of the journal/collection/proceedings title;

11.2.2. at the end of the description, specify the DOI of the article.

11.2.3. alphabetic symbols of output data (volume, number, pages) must be represented by abbreviations of English words (vol., no., pp.);

11.2.4. only the name of the publishing house is transliterated; the word "publishing house" is written in abbreviated English (for example, Nauka Publ.);

11.2.5. if the source is published in a language that uses a non-Latin script system (Cyrillic, hieroglyphics, etc.), the source description must include the language of publication: (in Russian), (in Chinese). In all other cases the language is omitted;

11.2.6. the requirement of clause 11.2.1 does not apply to the authors ' surnames if the author insists on the transliteration of his / her surname accepted by him / her and used in all articles;

11.2.7. you can not transliterate the description without translating the title of the article or the title of the book into English.

11.3. Transliterated references to books:

11.3.1. the translation of the book title into English is given with an indication at the end of the description of the language of the book (In Russian);

11.3.2. if the book is a translation of a foreign monograph, the indication "Rus. Ed.:" is added.
